From the Headmaster

Dear Parents,

It is five years ago that the country was getting ready to host the 2012 London Olympics; some of you, particularly in the older year groups, will remember the anticipation and excitement. I just want to spend a moment recalling, for me, one of the most inspiring races.

It was the 800m final and it was won by Kenyan athlete, David Rudisha in a world record time of 1 minute 40.9 seconds, the first time that the 1 minute 41 barrier had been broken. That was amazing, but also running in that final was British athlete, Andrew Osagie. He finished 8th in that race and yet his time of 1:43.77 was a world record for the eighth-placed finisher in an Olympic 800m final and made him the 4th fastest GB 800m runner of all time. His time would have won the gold medal in the previous 3 Olympic finals. Andrew Osagie may not have won gold, but he produced an extraordinary personal performance, bettering any previous time that he had run.

As the silverware at Prizegiving, and conversations with colleagues demonstrate, there have been some fantastic achievements at DH this year. To everyone who received an award, whether it recognised a special talent, academic brilliance – or a superhuman effort – and those who did not; I want us to remember that you don't always have to come first or win a prize to be a success.

During a meeting with some prospective parents recently, I was asked what the school's KPI's were (Key Performance Indicators); after getting over my relief that I knew what KPI's were, my answer was simple... happy children and that for me, ultimately, has to be the most important thing. I wrote to you all in May, updating you on the exciting current and planned developments at DH. These are underpinned by our new whole school principle of "be the best that you can be". We are not entering into a facilities arms race with other prep schools, instead we are improving what we already have, we are looking at all aspects of the school and asking the question: 'How can we do things better?'

As an aside, as you know, we are re-constructing our menus and if two children in the pre-prep are to be believed, this is most certainly needed. A while ago, we received an email from a concerned parent asking for a copy of the menu because, according to her little ones, all they had to eat at school was tomato ketchup!

The principle of "being the best you can be" is also pivotal for the children; it covers all aspects of their school life and their personal development. It is not necessarily about being the best or number one, we have started asking them, for example, 'How can you be the best friend you can be? How can you better your last set of exam results and even 'How can <u>you</u> help to make the world a better place to live in?' We want to be as good as we can be, and as good as any school can be, but this isn't about being 'better' than others. Competition is good as it reflects the world in which we live, but competition with oneself is more effective; success will happen if concentration is focused upon "being the best you can be".

This is certainly true of our Year 8 leavers who encapsulate exactly why, I believe, the final two years at prep school are so valuable. They have come a long way since the end of Year 6 and are now ready and although they may not admit it, I think more than a little sad to be leaving DH. As a group they have gained scholarship and academic success, but more than that they have matured into confident young people who, I think are more than capable of holding their own when they get to their senior schools. I would like to thank you as parents for your constant support and for trusting us with the huge responsibility of the education of your children. I would also like to take this opportunity to thank you for giving us feedback via the recent parent survey; we had an 87% response. It is always heartening and welcome to have positive feedback but equally as important are your constructive comments and perceptions, which are extremely valuable in helping us improve as a school. The request for holiday boarding and cask ales at Parents' match tea will not, however, feature prominently in my development plan! In the words of the well-known philosopher and sage, Bruce Lee: `If you always put limits on everything you do, physical and anything else, it will spread into your work and into your life. There are no limits. There are only plateaux, and you must not stay there, you must go beyond

Focus On...Extra-Curricular

At DH, we offer a wide range of extra-curricular activities. Some of these dovetail with or enhance subjects already covered within the curriculum and some provide an introduction to areas which children go on to enjoy at senior school and beyond.

Apart from the enrichment element, the importance of activities with regard to applications to Senior Schools and later, to university should not be underestimated. Indeed in a recent survey of 63 university admissions teams, commissioned by the gap-year provider, World Challenge, some 59% said that evidence of extra-curricular activities has become more pivotal in their decision-making. They are obviously focussing on academic achievement but at a time when many candidates achieve the same high grades at A Level, evidence of additional skills and interests are invaluable.

On our new website, (to be launched in September), we will feature a description of each of the activities we offer and of course, parents can to speak to activity leaders, all of whom are well-qualified and experienced in their fields. Children are also welcome to experience a `taster' session before committing to joining a group.

Next term, we will be adding Experimental Photography and Print Making, and Engineering Club to our repertoire bringing the total number of activities offered to 16: Ballet, Band Project, Cookery, Cricket, Engineering, Experimental Photography, Football, Gymnastics, Judo, LAMDA, Mandarin, Multi-Sports, Performing Arts, Riding, Tennis and Yoga.

Our Leadership programme further enhances the children's all-round education fostering the teamwork and organisational skills which many employers now seek. (See Page 6 for details of this term's Leadership events).

..... Entrepreneurship is also encouraged with our Year 8s always set a challenge post-CE. Last year, they had to plan a wedding and this year, it was a world cruise. As a small school, we are able to react to the children's own ideas in terms of entrepreneurship. This might be anything from organising a cake or craft sale for charity or, as happened this term, a pupil offering an aerial photograph of the school for sale, (which he took using a drone and which he markets via a website). (See overleaf). When looking at scholarships, senior schools may look for evidence of participation in extra-curricular activities. Indeed, the prestigious Millennium Scholarship to Brighton College includes an element of `Service' alongside Academic and Sporting or Musical achievement and three DH pupils have been successful in achieving this award, having organised collections of food and warm clothing for `Off the Fence' - a Brighton-based charity.

At the time of writing, we have not only raised the £800 needed for this year but will start in September 'in credit' thanks to the money raised by Charity Day.

The boys made posters advertising their fund-raising event and sold tickets to pupils across the school. The current craze for fidget spinners meant that their final total far exceeded the boys' expectations.

Father Jeremias visited Dorset House earlier in the term to thank the children at Dorset House for their support. As a result of what he had to say and some photos of 'our' Indian students in school, George Redgrove (Year 3) donated £20 of his own money - he actually wanted to give all his savings but we managed to persuade him to keep some back for himself! Archie Cox (Year 6) took aerial photos of DH with his drone and raised £20 for FEAST by selling one to the Headmaster! And finally, Ollie Godfrey (Year 3) teamed up with his younger brother Henry (Year 1) in half term and the two boys spent a day selling drinks and other items from a stall outside their house. They raised just over £10 and inspired two other girls in Year 3 to issue the 'DH Summer Challenge' - encouraging every pupil in the school to find an enterprising and imaginative way of raising a little money for FEAST over the summer holidays.

'Science is Cool!'

Pupils from Reception to Year 3 were divided into mixed age groups and spent a lovely morning working in the lab and Pre-Prep classrooms on a variety of activities. Comments such as "wow this is fun" and "science is cool" could be heard from excited pupils.

Activities included: separating salt from rock salt, testing everyday household chemicals to see if they were acid, alkali or neutral, testing the elastic strength of a spring and elastic band, using chromatography to separate a mixture of dyes and inks, investigating conductors and insulators of electricity. In the lab pupils investigated the velocity of fidget spinners and looked at the factors that affect the speed of a rocket using vitamin C tablets!! The pupils loved wearing their white coats for the more messy experiments. Year 8 were on hand to run the whole event and supervising staff were very pleased at how patient they were with the younger pupils. They helped explain their discoveries and conclusions in a very professional way.

Monty Burr came first in the shot. To finish the evening off, the U10 and U12 girls and boys won their relays. On Thursday 18th May, DH hosted their second U9 athletics track meeting. With eight schools each entering four boys and four girls into the competition, there was a great atmosphere. DH athletes displayed some potential talent and the outstanding performances came from Hamish Skinner in winning the hurdles and Finn Blunden-Hare the 200m. The Dorset House girls and boys also won their respective relays. Flora Skinner came second in the 200m and **Sofia Thompson** came second in the 75m to add to Dorset House's success. Dorset House girls were delighted to win the overall Girls Trophy, Prebendal came second and Great Ballard third. On the track, DH had one finalist -Alex Leech came 7th in 100m final. Sam Green's throw qualified him to compete in the National IAPS in Birmingham and we wish him all the very best.


