From the Headmaster

To mark National Careers Week, we were lucky enough to be able to welcome Katie Jones, the Head of Careers at Brighton College and Georgina Stafford, Head of Sixth Form at Ardingly College to our Open Morning. They gave talks on careers and the different sixth form options which senior schools offer. I know, for our children, these considerations may seem a long way off, but **prep** schools not only need to **prep**are children for their senior schools, but also lay the foundations and skills needed for their future roles and life in general.

"We are currently preparing students for jobs that don't exist yet, using technologies that haven't been invented, in order to solve problems, we don't even know are problems yet."

It is very likely that you are familiar with this quote from 'Did you know?' aka 'Shift Happens' which started out as a PowerPoint presentation from a US High School in 2006. Since then it has had millions of views and has been updated numerous times. Whatever the veracity of the statistics it contains, one cannot dispute the truism running throughout... that the constantly evolving and changing world in which our children will work and which they will inhabit will be very different from ours.

There has been much in the media recently about occupations which are currently under threat, particularly with the advent of AI, robotics and algorithms. Roles in the workplace have always adjusted to the demands and technology of the time; there are no longer such jobs as

switchboard operators, street lamp lighters or coal stockers. When I was at university, being an app developer, a social media manager or an Uber driver would have been completely alien concepts.

The question is, therefore, how should we prepare children for the future? As with anything, there are as many viewpoints as one would wish to read. The Duke of Edinburgh's Award recently cited some very interesting research which concludes that soft skills and personality: "personal attributes that enable someone to interact effectively and harmoniously with other people," are the "top attributes the majority of business leaders look for when hiring."

One can also be certain that in our performance and social media driven world, the ability to overcome setbacks and navigate 'bumps in the road' in terms of coping with disappointment and developing emotional resilience is probably more important than it has ever been. In partnership with parents, these aspects of development will continue to be a major focus of what we do at DH. As a footnote, I am often out and about chatting to children; on one occasion at mini-break last week I asked one boy how his day was going and he did not answer. Concerned, I then asked him if he was ok - he then smiled and said, "I'm good, thank you Sir, I was just eating a biscuit and didn't want to talk to you with my mouth full." Focus On...Reception



What sort of environment would you would want a 4-year old to be in when they start their school life?

One that excites them to skip into school; where all their senses are ignited and a real love of learning and 'doing' is established?

This is what we endeavour to create for our 4 and 5 year olds. But how?

Well, through providing a creative curriculum where 'learning' is all joined up, such as our recent topic on 'Dinosaurs'. Facts can be learnt about what they ate of course but we searched for bones! We made dinosaur nests by going out and getting moss and then painting and creating in art. In literacy we made a class poem about our dinosaur; we built dinosaur lands out of mud and slime, linking it to Science experiments with questions such as, 'How can we get a dinosaur out of the ice block?' Those eager absorbent minds are stimulated and develop wanting to learn. But it's not all about the exciting learning that takes place, it's the child-friendly environment - creating a bright and colourful inside and outside classroom. The knowledge of how children develop in these early years is also vital - as is supporting parents in their child's growth.

We ensure that the children have the foundation tools for learning to read and write, each child is an individual learning at their own pace as we engage children in our phonics programme of Read, Write Inc., which is a fastpaced fun programme ensuring these early skills are truly embedded. This follows on as they move to Years 1 and 2. The main aim is for all the children in Reception to feel safe and secure and a vital part of the DH family. Here they are cared for as individuals by their teachers who are ready to listen to and support them with an in-depth knowledge of children's early development but also from the whole school community. They can feel relaxed enough to give the Headmaster a hug; they know the Year 8s by name; they grow with a love of the nature and the beautiful surroundings that we have to offer. They really are the 'happy' child that all parents want and they know that 'every child matters'.

She is a keep sportswoman and was preparing to represent Great Britain in the 2012 Olympic Games as a swimmer when it was discovered that she had a fracture in her spine. Having endured a failed operation to repair this, she eventually recovered and embarked on training as a tennis player before switching to wheelchair racing on the suggestion of another athlete.

She found she was rather good at this and is now aiming for the Tokyo games.

It was fascinating to hear the children's questions to Lizzie following her presentation. From Reception to Year 8, the children were captivated by the story and asked everything from how many bones she had broken (70+ at the last count) to where she trains (sometimes in London and sometimes on the seafront in Worthing) and how disabled athletes are categorised (it's complicated and under reivew!).

Lizzie needs to raise funds to make her dream of representing Team GB a reality and Ms Hutchings has set Year 5 the challenge to find ways of helping her.

The course was run over a loop of 3/4 mile, lapping the playing fields and taking in the spectacular views of Amberley castle and the River Arun. Over 100 children were involved and Geoff Wightman added to the occasion with his professional commentary. Each team comprised of four runners and the boys' event was won by Windlesham School with Dorset House second and Westbourne House third. The girls' event was won by Dorset House, the team comprising Ella Lawson, Flora Skinner, Molly Ormerod and Alice Crowley, in a new record of 30 mins 22 secs. Pennthorpe came second and Westbourne House third. Guest of honour was Jake Wightman, who contested the World Indoor Championship 1500m for Great Britain the previous week and presented the prizes.



At the end of the term, Dorset House took teams to the Great Ballard cross country meeting. The U9 and U11 girls and boys produced some outstanding results. 

Please look out for the 'DH' stand at the Point to Point meeting at Parham on 28th April - there may be cake on offer!




